The solid walls and thick reveals of masonry homes engender a sense of retreat, which makes them well suited to resort-style architecture

In the Balinese tradition

With its dramatic entrance and pavilion architecture, this resort-style masonry house is more akin to a boutique hotel

Country living is invariably a lifestyle choice, which is why a house designed to reinforce the sense of escape will always sit well in a rural setting.

For this new house on a 1ha country site, designer Mark Wilson of Masonry Design Solutions expanded on the theme.

"The house reflects a distinct Balinese architectural influence," he says. "In many ways it is reminiscent of a boutique resort hotel – it's a lifestyle property for people who want to live in the country but don't want the hard work that goes with it."

In keeping with traditional Balinese architecture, the 45m-long masonry house is comprised of three linked pavilions. The roof also pays homage to resort architecture – its steep pitch and asphalt shingles reference traditional thatched pavilions.

And like a resort hotel, the entrance is centrally positioned to provide a formal symmetry. Gas fires flank the entry, which features stepping stones across a reflection pond. Thin, one-metre-wide columns pierce the roof, providing a strong vertical element to balance the horizontal lines Preceding pages and facing page top: This new house on a 1ha country site references traditional Balinese resort hotels. The family living room incorporates built-in shelving and a recessed television above the fireplace. Wilson says most of the furniture was custom designed by Masonry Design Solutions, with many pieces manufactured in Bali. Other specially imported items include traditional statues, pots and bowls.
